Subjects: Climate Action and Sustainable Development, Design, English, Enterprise, Science













Lesson Title and Summary: Creating a Pecha Kucha

A Pecha Kucha (means chit chat in Japanese) is a presentation format that encourages presenters to be concise and use the relationship between image and text. The Pecha Kucha format is 20 slides with a 20 second time limit per slide - 400 seconds.

In this lesson learners will be introduced to the relationship between image and the text, gain an awareness of and how this can be used for effective communication and messaging.

Vocabulary: Analysis, Format, Message, Pecha Kucha

In this lesson, the learner will:

- · Develop research skills
- · Share ideas and opinions
- · Develop the understanding of the Pecha Kucha method
- Analyse Pecha Kuchas
- Develop presentation understanding of presentation skills

Materials

- Internet access
- · Worksheet: Pecha Kucha analysis
- Paper
- Pens, pencils or markers
- Media links for blended learning

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ACTIVITY INSTRUCTIONS

Activity 1: Active Viewing Task: What is a Pecha Kucha (20 mins)

- 1. Watch the video: A Pecha Kucha about Pecha Kucha [6:58 mins] https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jJ2yeplaAtE
- 2. Ask learners to notice any words they don't understand e.g. constraints. Discuss the words.
- 3. Visit the global Pecha Kucha <u>www.pechakucha.com</u> (group or in pairs) and view at least 2 presentations select contrasting presentations
- 4. Ask learners to use the Pecha Kucha analysis worksheet to consider the presentation format.
- 5. As a group discuss learner's answers from the worksheets what did they think?
 - Does this feel easier or harder as a format for a presentation?
 - Did they notice anything about the presentations
 - What did they like about the format?
 - Was there anything they didn't like?

Activity 2: Active Viewing Task: What makes a good presentation (20 mins)

- 1. Have learners watch the video Bad Presentation by BTEC learners.
- 2. Use the Pecha Kucha presentation worksheet [insert name] to review the presentation.
- 3. Discuss their reviews as a class.
- 4. Watch the first part of the second video, 'Examples of Good / Bad Presentations stop at 1:24min
- 5. Have them review the learners' actions in the videp and compare with the previous video.
- 6. After the comparison and discussion begin the video again and watch the good presentation example and discuss.

NB: This activity can be done as a class or in their groups and reported back.

REFLECTIVE EXERCISE: 3-2-1

- · Three things they feel they have learnt from the exercise
- Two things they found most interesting and would like to explore more
- One their opinion they have about the site / exercises


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EXTENSION / REDUCTION ACTIVITIES:

Reduction: For a shorter class, undertake Activity 1 Steps part 1,3,4 with steps 1,3 of Activity 2.

Extension: For a longer class, extend the discussion in each activity about how the learners' might improve their presentations by introducing the presentation skills videos from the Media Box.

Flipped classroom - encourage learners to explore the Pecha Kucha presentations - see media box and bring in an example that they really like – Discuss this in the next class as preparation for their own Pecha Kuchas.




